this new work by gerald murnane is a fictionalised autobiography told in thirty sections each of which begins with the memory of a book that has left an image on the writer s mind the titles aren t given but the reader follows the clues recalling in the process a parade of authors the great the popular and the now forgotten the images themselves with their scenes of marital discord violence and madness or their illuminated landscapes that point to the consolations of a world beyond fiction give new intensity to murnane s habitual concern with the anxieties and aspirations of the writing life in the absence of religious belief a history of books is accompanied by three shorter pieces of fiction which play on these themes featuring the writer at different ages as a young boy a teacher and an old recluse

cornell university is fortunate to have as its historian a man of morris bishop s talents and devotion as an accurate record and a work of art possessing form and personality his book at once conveys the unique character of the early university reflected in its vigorous founder its first scholarly president a brilliant and eccentric faculty the hardy student body and sometimes unfortunately its early architecture and establishes cornell s wider significance as a case history in the development of higher education cornell began in rebellion against the obscurantism of college education a century ago its record claims the author makes a social and cultural history of modern america this story will undoubtedly entrance cornellians it will also charm a wider public dr allan nevins historian wrote i anticipated that this book would meet the sternest tests of scholarship insight and literary finish i find that it not only does this but that it has other high merits it shows grasp of ideas and forces it is graphic in its presentation of character and idiosyncrasy it lights up its story by a delightful play of humor felicitously expressed its emphasis on fundamentals without pomposity or platitude is refreshing perhaps most important of all it achieves one goal that in the history of a living university is both extremely difficult and extremely valuable it recreates the changing atmosphere of time and place it is written very plainly by a man who has known and loved cornell and ithaca for a long time who has steeped himself in the traditions and spirit of the institution and who possesses the enthusiasm and skill to convey his understanding of these intangibles to the reader the distinct personalities of ezra cornell and first president andrew dickson white dominate the early chapters for a vignette of the founder see bishop s description of his first buildings cascadilla morrill mcgraw white sibley at best he writes they embody the character of ezra cornell grim gray sturdy and economical to the english historian james anthony froude mr cornell was the most surprising and venerable object i have seen in america the first faculty chosen by president white reflected his character his idealism his faith in social emancipation by education his dislike of dogmatism confinement and inherited orthodoxy while the romantic upstate gothic architecture of such buildings as the president s house now andrew d white center for the humanities sage chapel and franklin hall may be said to portray the taste and soul of andrew dickson white other memorable characters are louis fuertes the

beloved naturalist his student hugh troy who once borrowed fuertes rhinoceros foot wastebasket for illicit if hilarious purposes the more noteworthy and the more eccentric among the faculty of succeeding presidential eras and of course napoleon the campus dog whose talent for hailing streetcars brought him home safely and alone from the penn game the humor in a history of cornell is at times kindly at times caustic and always illuminating

the book of revelation has served as a language arsenal in a great many of the social cultural and political conflicts in western history again and again revelation has stirred some dangerous men and women to act out their own private apocalypses above all the moral calculus of revelation the demonization of one's enemies the sanctification of revenge taking and the notion that history must end in catastrophe can be detected in some of the worst atrocities and excesses of every age including our own for all of these reasons the rest of us ignore the book of revelation only at our impoverishment and more to the point at our own peril the mysterious author of the book of revelation or the apocalypse as the last book of the new testament is also known never considered that his sermon on the impending end times would last beyond his own life in fact he predicted that the destruction of the earth would be witnessed by his contemporaries yet revelation not only outlived its creator this vivid and violent revenge fantasy has played a significant role in the march of western civilization ever since revelation was first preached as the revealed word of jesus christ it has haunted and inspired hearers and readers alike the mark of the beast the antichrist 666 the whore of babylon armageddon and the four horsemen of the apocalypse are just a few of the images phrases and codes that have burned their way into the fabric of our culture the

questions raised go straight to the heart of the human fear of death and obsession with the afterlife will we individually or collectively ride off to glory or will we drown in hellfire for all eternity as those who best manipulate this dark vision learned which side we fall on is often a matter of life or death honed into a weapon in the ongoing culture wars between states religions and citizenry revelation has significantly altered the course of history kirsch whom the washington post calls a fine storyteller with a flair for rendering ancient tales relevant and appealing to modern audiences delivers a far ranging entertaining and shocking history of this scandalous book which was nearly cut from the new testament from the fall of the roman empire to the black death the inquisition to the protestant reformation the new world to the rise of the religious right this chronicle of the use and abuse of the book of revelation tells the tale of the unfolding of history and the hopes fears dreams and nightmares of all humanity

in 1990 namibia gained its independence after a decades long struggle against south african rule and before that against german colonialism this book the first new scholarly general history of namibia in two decades provides a fresh synthesis of these events and of the much longer pre colonial period a history of namibia opens with a chapter by john kinahan covering the evidence of human activity in namibia from the earliest times to the nineteenth century and for the first time making a synthesis of current archaeological research widely available to non specialists in subsequent chapters marion wallace weaves together the most up to date academic research in english and german on namibian history from the mid eighteenth century to the present she explores histories of migration production and power in the pre colonial period the changes triggered by european expansion and the dynamics of the period of formal colonialism the coverage of german rule includes a full chapter on the genocide of 1904 8 here wallace outlines the history and historiography of the wars fought in central and southern namibia and the subsequent mass imprisonment of defeated africans in concentration camps the final two chapters analyse the period of african nationalism apartheid and war between 1946 and 1990 the book s conclusion looks briefly at the development of namibia in the two decades since independence a history of namibia provides an invaluable introduction and reference source to the past of a country that is often neglected despite its significance in the history of the region and indeed for that of european colonialism and international relations it makes accessible the latest research on the country illuminates current controversies puts forward new insights and suggests future directions for research the book s extensive bibliography adds to its usefulness for scholar and general reader alike

examines the many reasons and motivations for the destruction of books throughout history citing specific acts from the smashing of ancient sumerian tablets to the looting of libraries in post war iraq

borno in northeast nigeria is notorious today as the home of an islamist terrorist group boko haram whose insurgency is a major security threat but it was once the

heartland of the kanuri speaking royal empire of kanem borno renowned throughout africa and beyond which in its later incarnation the bornu empire lasted from 1380 to 1893 this book offers the reader the first modern history of borno drawing upon sources in london berlin paris kaduna and maiduguri and recently released migrated archives as its longevity suggests what is particularly remarkable about borno is the permanence of its boundaries its territorial integrity which dates back centuries and the political and social identities that such borders framed in the minds of its inhabitants
