this book focuses on inclusion and exclusion in sporting activities among young people of varying cultural identities in a multicultural society it is important for all those in culturally diverse society especially academics teachers and sports administrators who are interested in the issue of exclusion and inclusion of cultural minorities in sport

this book examines the civil social interactions which have shaped and continue to influence the political and social development of modern gulf societies it analyses the influence of public and private social spaces such as sports arenas and dawawin as well as developments in the legal and cultural spheres geographically the volume covers bahrain iran kuwait oman qatar saudi arabia and the uae each chapter discusses a different aspect of current trends in society offering a multidimensional perspective on recent developments in so doing the chapters highlight the existence of a growing participation culture as a force for dynamic social change in a global context bringing to attention the continuing social change in public and private spaces which have increased public social interactions within the last ten years this book also demonstrates the opening of dialogues between the public and the authorities the contributors are established scholars living in the gulf as well as academics with long term field research in the region thus providing unique perspectives on current sociopolitical trends in the gulf states participation culture in the gulf will be useful to students and scholars of middle eastern politics and society as well as social movements and political participation more generally

traditionally social science treated culture as a peripheral issue but the last twenty years have witnessed a cultural turn throughout the social sciences culture is now at the core of debate culture and economy after the cultural turn examines the impact of the cultural turn for the social sciences in relation to the decline of interest in economic aspects of society it presents a number of responses to the changing relationship between culture and economy and to the way in which the cultural turn has sought to understand it contributors from a wide range of disciplines present differing views on these matters in relation to issues of political sensibilities and movements equality and recognition cultural management

citizenship and identity offers an analysis of contemporary politics and of the scepticism and apathy which characterise the political life of modern democracies starting from exploration of liberal democracy and a critique of the fragmentation of contemporary politics this book develops a republican perspective as an alternative framework for political institutions and civic participation

during the ancient greek and roman eras participation in political communities at the local level and assertion of belonging to these communities were among the fundamental principles and values on which societies would rely for that reason citizenship and democracy are generally

considered as concepts typical of the political experience of classical antiquity these concepts of citizenship and democracy are often seen as inconsistent with the political social and ideological context of the late and post roman world as a result scholarship has largely overlooked participation in local political communities when it comes to the period between the disintegration of the classical model of local citizenship in the later roman empire and the emergence of pre communal entities in northern italy from the ninth century onwards by reassessing the period c 300 1000 ce through the concepts of civic identity and civic participation this volume will reassess both the impact of classical heritage with regard to civic identities in the political experiences of the late and post roman world and the rephrasing of new forms of social and political partnership according to ethnic or religious criteria in the early middle ages starting from the earlier imperial background the fourteen chapters examine the ways in which people shared identity and gave shape to their communal life as well as the role played by the people in local government in the later roman empire the germanic kingdoms byzantium the early islamic world and the early medieval west by focusing on the post classical late antique and early medieval periods this volume intends to be an innovative contribution to the general history of citizenship and democracy

this book addresses the impact of migration on the formation and transformation of identity and its continuous negotiations its ground is the understanding of identity as a complex social phenomenon resulting from constant negotiations between personal conditions social relationships and institutional frameworks migrations understood as dynamic processes that do not end when landing in the host country offer the best conditions to analyze the construction and transformation of social identities in the postcolonial and globalized societies searching for novel epistemologies and methodologies the research questions here addressed are how identity is negotiated in migration processes and how these negotiations work in contemporary multiethnic europe this edited volume brings to the field a novel convergence of theoretical and

empirical approaches by gathering together scholars from different countries of europe and the mediterranean area from different disciplines and backgrounds challenging the traditional discipline division

young people place and identity offers a series of rich insights into young people s everyday lives what places do young people engage with on a daily basis how do they use these places how do their identities influence these contexts by working through common sense understandings of young people s behaviours and the places they occupy the author seeks to answer these and other questions in doing so the book challenges and re shapes understandings of young people s relationships with different places and identities the textbook is one of the first books to map out the scales themes and sites engaged with by young people on a daily basis as they construct their multiple identities the scales explored here include the body neighbourhood and community mobilities and transitions and urban rural settings and how these all shape and are shaped by young people s identities each chapter explores how social identities such as race gender sexuality class disability and religion are constructed within particular contexts and influenced by multiple processes of inclusion and exclusion these discussions are supported by details of the research methods and ethical issues involved in researching young people s lives drawing upon research from a range of contexts including europe north america and australasia this book demonstrates the complex ways in which young people creatively shape contest and resist their engagements with different places and identities the range of issues topics and case studies explored include ethical and methodological issues in youth research youth subcultures experiences of home territorialism youth and crime political engagement and participation responses to global issues engagements with different institutional contexts negotiating public space the transition to adulthood drinking cultures the author explores these issues through blending together original empirical research theory and policy individual chapters are supported by key themes project ideas and suggested further reading details of key authors journals and research centres and organisations are also included at the end of the book this textbook will be pertinent for undergraduate and postgraduate students and academic researchers interested in better understanding the relationships between young people places and identities

today s youth are challenging the older political class around the world and are forming new political generations examples from south africa and elsewhere where peace processes were deemed to be successful show signs of youth disapproval of the current post conflict conditions moreover the arab spring witnessed numerous youth movements emerge in authoritarian and illiberal contexts this book was prepared in light of these discussions and aims to contribute to these ongoing debates on youth politics by presenting the situation of youth in the kurdistan region of iraq kri as a case study it will be the first book that specifically focuses on the iraqi kurdish youth and their political social and economic participation in kurdistan the contemporary history of the kri is marked by conflict war and ethnic cleansing under saddam hussein and the tyranny of the ba ath regime significantly affecting the political situation of the kurds in the middle east most of the recent academic literature has focused on the broader picture or in other

using the case study of the kadazan of sabah a region in the malaysian section of borneo this book examines national ethnic and local identities in post colonial states it shows the importance of the connection between lived experience and identity and belonging and by doing so provides a deeper and fuller explanation of the apparently contradictory conflict between different collective forms of identification and the way in which they are employed in reference to everyday situations based on ethnographic fieldwork and historical analysis the book reconstructs the development of the cultural forms and labels associated with the collective identities it studies the author employs an approach that sees collective identification as an expression of everyday practices and that stresses the importance of participation and familiarity between forms of identification and lived experience in this context he considers anthropological debates about state minorities relations and issues of dignity and respect explaining state minority relations in malaysia and more generally in other post colonial realities the insights presented are highly relevant to other cases of conflicting allegiances and identity politics in settings of post colonial nation building

how do children determine which identity becomes paramount as they grow into adolescence and early adulthood which identity results in patterns of behaviour as they develop to whom or to which group do they feel a sense of belonging how might children adolescents and young adults negotiate the gap between their own sense of identity and the values promoted by external influences the contributors explore the impact of globalization and pluralism on the way most children and adolescents grow into early adulthood they look at the influences of media and technology that can be felt within the living spaces of their homes competing with the religious and cultural influences of family and community and consider the ways many children and adolescents have developed multiple and virtual identities which help them to respond to different circumstances and contexts they discuss the ways that many children find themselves in a perpetual state of shifting identities without ever being firmly grounded in one potentially leading to tension and confusion particularly when there is conflict between one identity and another this can result in increased anxiety and diminished self esteem this book explores how parents educators and social and health workers might have a raised awareness of the issues generated by plural identities and the overpowering human need to belong so that they can address associated issues and nurture a sense of wholeness in children and adolescents as they grow into early adulthood

rights neither exclude marginalized cultural groups nor reproduce rigid distinctions between seemingly exclusive cultures

the story of arts and cultural policy in the twenty first century is inherently of global concern no matter how local it seems at the same time questions of identity have in many ways become more challenging than before narrative identity and the map of cultural policy once upon a time in a globalized world explores how and why stories and identities sometimes merge and often clash in an arena in which culture and policy may not be able to resolve every difficulty devereaux and griffin argue that the role of narrative is key to understanding these issues they offer a wide ranging history and justification for narrative frameworks as an approach to cultural policy and open up a wider field of discussion about the ways in which cultural politics and cultural identity are being deployed and interpreted in the present with deep roots in the past this timely book will be of great interest not just to students of narrative and students of arts and cultural policy but also to administrators policy theorists and cultural management practitioners

questions of identity continue to intrigue theologians in africa and african intellectuals often note communal emphases in african thought this raises the question how do ecclesiologies in africa engage with identity concerns and how do they envision the christian identity stephanie lowery argues in this book that theologians in africa provide theological and biblical arguments regarding christian identity that are relevant to individual christians and ecclesiologies in all contexts she also proposes the social identity approach as a tool that can both further articulate and advance these discussions

range of independent research programs nurturing morality makes clear that most forms of human interaction are laden with moral content it highlights thorny and complex moral questions that cannot be resolved by simple adherence to moral rules and on the basis of empirically grounded findings contributors to this volume provide recommendations for how adults can offer valuable guidance to young people learning to negotiate life in a global society for clinicians researchers and students nurturing morality provides much needed insight and advice on young people s moral development

the beginning of the millennium has been influenced by a visible acceleration of the globalisation process a complex and dynamic phenomenon it has generated a series of consequences at the political strategic and military levels as well as the cultural level the increase of interdependence between actors on the international stage modern technologies means of communication cross border relations and the constant flux of goods capital services and people entail major changes for the tools used by states in international relations in this context states are obligated to identify solutions to overcome risks and threats posed to peace and security as current regional conflicts can easily become international in order to streamline communication and interstate cooperation beyond the classic appeal to tolerance there has been in recent years an exponential increase of the use of culture and by extension cultural diplomacy thus cultural cooperation represents a vital part of the current process of transformation and transition adopting an interdisciplinary character this volume investigates some of the aspects that emphasise the essential role of culture as a promoter and supporter of peace and security as an agent of regional and national development as well as its contributions to attracting and retaining human and financial capital regional branding and improving quality of life among others the volume will particularly appeal to professors and students of political science international relations history economy law and sociology as well as intellectuals interested in the catalysing role of culture in all areas of activity

urban planning and cultural identity reviews the intense spatiality of conflict over identity construction in three cities where culture and place identity are not just post modernist playthings but touch on the raw sensibilities of who people define themselves to be berlin as the reborn german capital has put coming to terms with the holocaust and the memory of the gdr full square at the centre of urban planning detroit raises questions about the impotence and complicity of planners in the face of the most extreme metropolitan spatial apartheid in the united states and where african american identity now seems set on a separatist course in belfast in the clash of irish nationalist and ulster unionist traditions place can take on intense emotional meanings in relation to which planners as mediators of space can seem ill equipped the book drawing on extensive interview sources in the case study cities poses a question of broad relevance can planners fashion a role in using environmental concerns such as local agenda 21 as a vehicle of building a sense of common citizenship in which cultural difference can embed itself
