the author writes an open love letter to the african american women in his life proclaiming his adoration and respect for women of color in america

the lives and conditions of black women are inseparable from and inextricably linked to all dimensions of social and political life black women under state centres the realities of black women both in process and theory who are living at the intersections of race poverty surveillance and social services abdillahi who is uniquely positioned as a community organizer care worker public intellectual and scholar engaged twenty women living at these life intersections in the greater toronto area the text undertakes a deep and studied inquiry into these women s subjective experiences of surveillance while on the province of ontario s social assistance program ontario works and interrogates the

dimensional effects of those experiences offering a timely and crucial contribution to the discourse around abolition abdillahi makes explicit the ways in which social systems are made opaque so that we don't connect them to the carceral state this concept of carceral care talks to abolition as the broad concept that it is a fully embraced understanding that abolition dismantles systems of policing that extend beyond the institution we call the police three major themes emerge through her inquiry surveillance poverty and morality each interconnected to a larger social and public policy discourse abdillahi employs critical race theory and black feminist thought as primary theoretical lenses as she animates the lives of these women alongside and in conversation with existing research theory and practice revealing direct links among their experience in order to demonstrate the shared longstanding and ongoing historicity of the interconnectedness of black women's experience globally the vast majority of the book's citations are from black Canadians giving the text its own narrative around citational practice through a dynamic interlacing of contemporary critical thought and lived experience black women under state contributes to filling a gap in social policy literature which has typically disregarded the subjective experiences of black women or treated them as a mere addendum

pioneering this history as hine vividly depicts it sheds light on the development of african american professionals and offers as well the opportunity to analyze the intersection of race and gender the nation well researched and innovative highly recommended library journal the book is full of poignant and sympathetic portraits of black nurses in their dedication and idealism in their pain and anger at the relentless contempt of white nurses and in their deep concern for their community's health needs hine has brilliantly fulfilled an aim other historians have neglected the women's review of books this well researched book adds breadth and depth to the existing literature on the educational and professional history of black nurses including the development of black hospitals and training schools in the us highly recommended choice an important book not only because it is a serious effort to analyze nursing history in the context of american racism but also because it offers a vantage point on the experiences of black women at work medical humanities review darlene clark hine has written a thoughtful analysis of the struggles of african americans striving for professional status and recognition an illuminating study of the interaction of race and gender in the construction of a professional identity the journal of american history this pathbreaking study analyzes the impact of racism on the development of the nursing profession particularly on black women in the profession during the first

half of this century hine uncovers shameful episodes in nursing history and probes the nature and extent of racial conflict and cooperation in the profession

with the emergence of popular culture phenomena such as reality television blogging and social networking sites it is important to examine the representation of black women and the potential implications of those images messages and roles black women and popular culture the conversation continues provides such a comprehensive analysis using an array of theoretical frameworks and methodologies this collection features cutting edge research from scholars interested in the relationship among media society perceptions and black women the uniqueness of this book is that it serves as a compilation of hot topics including abc s scandal beyoncé s visual album and oprah s instagram page other themes have roots in reality television film and hip hop as well as issues of gender politics domestic violence and colorism the discussion also extends to the presentation and inclusion of black women in advertising print and digital media

in 1920 w e b du bois cited the damnation of women as linked to the devaluation of motherhood this dilemma he argues had a crushing blow on black women as they were forced into slavery black womanhood portrayed as hypersexual by nature became an enduring stereotype which did not coincide with the dignity of mother and wife this portrayal

continues to reinforce negative stereotypes of black women in the media today this book highlights how black women have been negatively portrayed in the media focusing on the export nature of media and its ability to convey notions of blackness to the public it argues that media such as rap music videos television dramas reality television shows and newscasts create and affect expectations of black women exploring the role that racism misogyny and media play in the representation of black womanhood it provides a foundation for challenging contemporary media s portrayal of black women

in this book brittany c slatton uses innovative internet research methods to reveal contemporary prejudices about relationship partners in doing so she thoroughly refutes the popular ideology of a post racial america slatton examines the deep frame of white men found in opinions and emotional reactions to black women and their body types personalities behaviours and styles of speech their internet responses to questionnaires shows how they treat as common sense radicalised gendered and classed versions of black women mythologizing black women argues that the internet acts as a backstage setting allowing white men to anonymously express raw feelings about race and sexuality without the fear of reprimand

black women s liberation movement music argues that the black women s liberation movement of the mid to late 1960s and 1970s was a unique combination of black political feminism black literary feminism and black musical feminism

among other forms of black feminism this book critically explores the ways the soundtracks of the black women s liberation movement often overlapped with those of other 1960s and 1970s social political and cultural movements such as the black power movement women s liberation movement and sexual revolution the soul funk and disco music of the black women s liberation movement era is simultaneously interpreted as universalist feminist in a general sense and black female focused this music s incredible ability to be interpreted in so many different ways speaks to the importance and power of black women s music and the fact that it has multiple meanings for a multitude of people within the worlds of both black popular movement studies and black popular music studies there has been a long standing tendency to almost exclusively associate black women s music of the mid to late 1960s and 1970s with the black male dominated black power movement or the white female dominated women s liberation movement however this book reveals that much of the soul funk and disco performed by black women was most often the very popular music of a very unpopular and unsung movement the black women s liberation movement black women s liberation movement music is an invaluable resource for students teachers and researchers of popular music studies american studies african american studies critical race studies gender studies and sexuality studies

elizabeth johnson s resistance and empowerment in black women s hair styling develops the argument that one way black women define themselves and each other is by the way they style groom their hair via endorsement by the media through advertisement idealized identification of black female celebrities and encouragement by professional celebrity hair stylists who serve as change agents as a result hair becomes a physical manifestation of their self identity revealing a private and personal mindset her research answers the following questions what is the relationship between black females choice of hairstyles grooming and transmitted messages of aesthetics by the dominant culture through culturally specific magazines what role do the natural hair blogs vlogs play as a change agent in encouraging or discouraging consumers grooming their hair in its natural state what impact does a globalized consumer market of black hair care products have on hispanic latin@s and bi racial women are black female generation y members more likely to receive backlash for failure to conform their hair to dominant standards in their hair adornment in the workplace johnson thus demonstrates that the major concern from messages sent to black women about their hair is its impact on black identity thus the goal of black women should be to break with hegemonic modes of seeing thinking and being for full liberation this critical and deep consciousness will debunk the messages told to black women that

their kinky frizzy thick hair is undesirable bad unmanageable and shackling

what does the tradition of marriage mean for people who have historically been deprived of its legal status generally thought of as a convention of the white middle class the marriage plot has received little attention from critics of african american literature in this study ann ducille uses texts such as nella larsen s quicksand 1928 and zora neale hurston s their eyes were watching god 1937 to demonstrate that the african american novel like its european and anglo american counterparts has developed around the marriage plot what she calls the coupling convention exploring the relationship between racial ideology and literary and social conventions ducille uses the coupling convention to trace the historical development of the african american women s novel she demonstrates the ways in which black women appropriated this novelistic device as a means of expressing and reclaiming their own identity more than just a study of the marriage tradition in black women s fiction however the coupling convention takes up and takes on many different meanings of tradition it challenges the notion of a single black literary tradition or of a single black feminist literary canon grounded in specifically black female language and experience as it explores the ways in which white and black male and female mainstream and marginalized traditions and canons have influenced and cross fertilized each other much more than a period study the coupling convention spans the period from 1853 to 1948 addressing the vital questions of gender subjectivity race and the canon that inform literary study today in this original work ducille offers a new paradigm for reading black women s fiction

in what innovative ways do novels by diasporic black women writers experiment with the representation of black subjectivity this collection explores the inventiveness of contemporary black women writers black british african caribbean african american who remake traditional understandings of blackness as the title word experimental signals these essays foreground the narrative form and stylistic innovations of the black authored novels they analyze they also show how these experiments with form mirror the novels convention breaking experiments with reimagining black female subjectivities while each novel of course represents the complexities of diasporic experiences differently some issues emerge that are broadly shared not just within a regional group but across geographical borders one feature of the collection is a comparative look at such linking themes across borders under the rubrics a return to precolonial systems of belief reinventions of mothering relational subjectivities memory history and haunting and posthumanist revaluations these themes take different shapes across the multitude of diverse cultures studied in this

book but together they establish a pan global imaginative practice

the first of its kind this edited volume provides in depth culturally sensitive material intended for addressing the unique concerns of black women with eating disorders in addition to comprehensive discussions and treatment guidelines for this population the contributing authors all of whom are black professionals providing direct care to black women offer a range of perspectives to help readers understand the whole experience of their black female clients this includes not only discussion of their clients physical health but also of their emotional lives and the ways in which the stresses of racism discrimination trauma and adverse childhood experiences can contribute to disordered eating through a wealth of diverse voices and stories chapters boldly tackle issues such as stereotypes and acculturative stress clinicians of any race will gain new tools for assessing diagnosing and treating disordered eating in black women and will be empowered to provide better care for their clients

black women have an image of themselves that differs from those others impose collectively the contributors to this anthology demonstrate that such socially constructed images hide the complexities and ambiguities the challenges and the joys experienced in the real lives of black women

2017 wilbur non fiction award recipient winner of the 2018 author s award in scholarly non fiction presented by the new jersey studies academic alliance winner 2020 kornitzer book prize given by drew university examines the oft overlooked role of non elite black women in the growth of northern suburbs and american protestantism in the first half of the twentieth century when a domestic servant named violet johnson moved to the affluent white suburb of summit new jersey in 1897 she became one of just barely a hundred black residents in the town of six thousand in this avowedly liberal protestant community the very definition of the suburbs depended on observance of unmarked and fluctuating race and class barriers but johnson did not intend to accept the status quo establishing a baptist church a year later a seemingly moderate act that would have implications far beyond weekly worship johnson challenged assumptions of gender and race advocating for a politics of civic righteousness that would grant african americans an equal place in a christian nation johnson s story is powerful but she was just one among the many working class activists integral to the budding days of the civil rights movement focusing on the strategies and organizational models church women employed in the fight for social justice adams tracks the intersections of politics and religion race and gender and

place and space in a new york city suburb a local example that offers new insights on northern racial oppression and civil rights protest as this book makes clear religion made a key difference in the lives and activism of ordinary black women who lived worked and worshiped on the margin during this tumultuous time

how have black women elders managed stress in black women s yoga history stephanie y evans uses primary sources to answer that question and to show how meditation and yoga from eras of enslavement segregation and migration to the civil rights black power and new age movements have been in existence all along life writings by harriet jacobs sadie and bessie delany eartha kitt rosa parks jan willis and tina turner are only a few examples of personal case studies that are included here illustrating how these women managed traumatic stress anxiety and depression in more than fifty yoga memoirs black women discuss practices of reflection exercise movement stretching visualization and chanting for self care by unveiling the depth of a struggle for wellness memoirs offer lessons for those who also struggle to heal from personal cultural and structural violence this intellectual history expands conceptions of yoga and defines inner peace as mental health healing and wellness that is both compassionate and political

black women film and video makers have been producing shorts documentaries and films since the early part of this century unfortunately not only has their work been overlooked by distributors but critical reviews have been few and far between conceived to redress that omission black women film and video artists is the first comprehensive history and analysis of this genre gathered here are noted scholars and critics as well as the film video makers themselves who offer insight into the work of underexplored artists the discussions range from pioneering to contemporary film makers and include artists such as madeline anderson monica freeman jacqueline shearer kathleen collins julie dash camille billops zeinabu irene davis and michelle parkerson among others contributors include jacqueline bobo carmen coustaut gloria j gibson c a griffith monique guillory carol munday lawrence o funmilayo makarah ntongela maselila jacqueline shearer p jane splawn

this book uses the life and work of caffie greene one of the most influential grassroots community activists and public health educators in twentieth century los angeles as a platform to examine the wider story of black women activists in recent united states history caffie greene worked to foster the development of unions black elected officials and black youth leaders within the black panthers and worked with a legion of women leaders to further progress in the fields of health care education youth employment welfare rights public transportation police reform and electoral politics the book traces greene s journey from her childhood plantation life in arkansas to her emergence as one of the most distinguished civil rights activists in los angeles history it provides in depth meticulously researched archival material to amplify the voice of a pivotal woman and analyzes how her contributions impacted the movements of the postwar era examining the pedagogical aspects of social protest as the main resource for consciousness raising among historically marginalized youth and adults caffie greene and black women activists asks the essential question what can we learn about grassroots community organizing that we do not yet know by centering a black woman like caffie greene s life what are the continuities in greene s political work between cold war radicalism black power and black feminism and that strict binaries like integrationist and black separatist nationalism and socialism and feminism and black power obscure this book will be of key interest to students and scholars studying black activist history black feminism and twentieth century united states history

journeys of black women in academe provides lessons that are instructive to faculty and administrators across race and gender boundaries relative to the successes and challenges that african american women continue to experience in academia
